Improve attendance and give pupils a positive start to the school day	Attendance of disadvantaged Pupil Premium (2020-21) was 94.85% compared with 97.08% for the whole school. These percentages do not include COVID-related absences.	
Raising numeracy standards	Maths: 75% of disadvantaged pupils attained the expected standard in 2021 compared to 59% of non-PP pupils.  25% of disadvantaged pupils attained the higher standard in 2021 compared to 18% of non-PP pupils.	
Raising literacy standards, in particular writing progress and attainment	Reading: 87.5% of disadvantaged pupils attained the expected standard in 2021 compared to 77% of non-PP pupils. 62.5% of disadvantaged pupils attained the higher standard in 2021 compared to 23% of non-PP pupils.	

Writing: 75% of disadvantaged pupils attained the <b>expected</b> standard in 2021 compared to 50% of non-PP pupils.  25% of disadvantaged pupils attained the
higher standard in 2021 compared to 5% of non-PP pupils.
