VALUES AND ETHOS STATEMENT

Our Mission "Our community, growing and learning together with Christ"

Our vision commits us to focusing on each child as a member of Christ's family. To do that, our school has to concentrate on first understanding and then developing each individual child's unique nature and potential. This must include his or her personality and attitudes, likes and dislikes, academic potential, speed of development, special needs, and particular gifts or talents.

As a Catholic school, with the help of our families, our parish and our local community, we will do our best to use the gifts that God has given us to make our world a richer place.

The Department for Education has introduced a statutory duty for schools to promote British Values more actively from September 2014, and to ensure they are taught in schools.

St. Mary's Catholic Primary School is committed to serving its community.

It recognises the multi-cultural, multi-faith and ever-changing nature of the United Kingdom. It also understands the vital role it has in ensuring that groups or individuals within the school are not subjected to intimidation or radicalisation by those wishing to unduly, or illegally, influence them.

The school follows equal opportunities guidance which guarantees that

there will be no discrimination against any individual or group, regardless of faith, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, political or financial status, or similar.

St. Mary's is dedicated to preparing students for their adult life beyond the formal, examined curriculum and ensuring that it



promotes and reinforces British values to all its students.

The government set out its definition of British values in the 2011 Prevent Strategy. The five key British Values are:

- Democracy
- The rule of law
- Individual liberty
- Mutual respect
- Tolerance of those of different faiths and beliefs

The school uses strategies within the national curriculum and beyond, to secure such outcomes for students. The ethos of our school, as summarised by our Mission Statement, is derived from Christian values which are at the heart of what we teach in school and encompass the five key values identified above.

The following examples illustrate some of the many ways St. Mary's seeks to instil British Values.

Democracy

Democratic values are an explicit part of the Catholic ethos of our school. Adults listen to the views of pupils and value their opinions. Pupils' voices can be heard through our School Council, Ambassadors, pupil interviews and questionnaires and through the teaching of Personal, Social, Health Education and Citizenship (PSHE&C).



The children learn about democracy through formal lessons and assemblies, but also through their involvement in the election of members of the School Council, Ambassadors, House Captains and Sport Captains.



Rule of Law

The importance of laws and rules are reinforced in the classroom as well as through school assemblies. Pupils are taught to understand the need for laws – laws are there for individual protection, the

responsibilities that this involves and the consequences when laws are broken.

Catholic law is taught through gospel values. Each class decides on their class values to act as their rules for the year. Right and wrong is taught through the upkeep of these values. Children show their respect of these values through circle time type activities as appropriate within their class. Pupils follow a positive behaviour policy and clearly understand the expectations, rewards and consequences that are used. Assemblies and discussions in class are rooted in our Catholic faith and beliefs, and focus on recognising right from wrong. The "Home School Agreement" is a bond between pupils and teachers, parents and governors – and reflects the changing needs of the school.

Individual Liberty


Pupils are encouraged to be independent learners and to make choices within a safe and supportive environment. A focus upon making the right choices is explicit through our assemblies and, as a Catholic school, our ethos emphasises that we are all the same in the eyes of God. Praise assembly celebrates each child's achievements and parents are invited to attend. Equal opportunity is planned for – all pupils have their moment to shine!

Developing the children's self-esteem and self-confidence is very important. Every Year 6 pupil has a job in school – they have work experience in Year 5 where they shadow the Year 6 roles. They are given job descriptions and fill in an application form outlining their skills and why they want to apply for particular jobs:

- Clerks
- Rangers
- Sports leaders
- ICT wizards
- Reporters
- Reading buddies
- Librarians

Lunchtime buddy roles are also available to younger children.

Pupils are encouraged to understand their personal freedom and are taught how to use these rights to best effect. All pupils are keen to support charities, whether local, national or global, and frequently initiate fund raising activities. Consideration and care for others is key to our Catholic faith, is evident in the ethos of our school, and is explicitly taught through our Religious Education curriculum and PSHE&C lessons.



Mutual Respect

Our school's ethos and behaviour policy are based on Gospel Values, with the important commandment being, 'Love one another as I have loved you'. Assemblies promote respect for others and the importance of good manners. All pupils are taught the importance of self-respect, honest and open communication with others, and fairness and justice. Pupils work collaboratively and value the opinions of others. The pupils support the learning goals of others and each class has well developed teaching partners.

Tolerance of those of Different Faiths and Beliefs

The Catholic life of the school sets high expectations for respect and tolerance of all faiths. As a Catholic worshipping community, children are taught that we are all created in the image and likeness of God and are reminded of their place in a culturally diverse society. This is achieved through our Religious Education curriculum and the spiritual life of the school. Respect and tolerance for members of our wider community is often achieved through fundraising for CAFOD, Father Hudson's homes, St. Giles Hospice etc. Assemblies and classwork



promote the diversity of society and the right for each person to be respected and valued equally, regardless of ability, gender, faith, heritage or race.
